Sackler Perinatal and Infant Psychiatry Fellowship 2024-2025

How to Apply

- Fellowship begins July 1, 2024 for one year with extension up to two years
- Stipend covers 0.5 FTE position that can be supplemented by faculty practice in Weill Cornell Medicine's Physician Organization
- Eligible applicants completed residency in Psychiatry and Child and Adolescent Psychiatry and possess or are eligible for a New York State license
- Send CV, letter of interest, and two letters of recommendation addressed to Soudabeh Givrad, M.D.

Clinical opportunities include work in outpatient Child Psychiatry clinic, Maternal-Infant Psychiatry service/Payne Whitney Women's Program, Neonatal Intensive Care Unit (NICU) and Neurodevelopmental follow up clinic. The Fellow will be seeing parent-infant/parent-young child psychotherapy cases, perinatal psychiatry cases for medication management and psychotherapy, consult in the NICU and the Neurodevelopmental follow up clinic, and conduct and supervise preschool age psychiatric evaluations. Soudabeh Givrad, M.D. is the main supervisor for these experiences, supplemented by specialized on site mentors.

Educational responsibilities and opportunities include planning and oversight of weekly Infant Psychiatry Seminar and supervision of Child Psychiatry fellows for preschool evaluations. The Fellow will participate in various teaching opportunities related to early childhood development and perinatal and infant mental health to general psychiatry and child and adolescent psychiatry residents, medical students, as well as trainees in other fields such as Neonatology, Pediatrics, and Obstetrics. The Fellow will additionally be involved in learning opportunities in perinatal psychiatry.

Research pertains to a specialized area of scholarly inquiry for a research project. Opportunities in infant mental health and perinatal psychiatry will be available through our perinatal and early childhood clinical services and under supervision of our reproductive psychiatry and child psychiatry faculty. Fellows also have opportunities to collaborate with the Center for Autism and the Developing Brain.
