ABSTRACT

This presentation will describe the affective, cognitive, and behavioral manifestations of self-loathing. It will then delineate four overlapping but nonetheless different origins of this malady: primal, shame based, guilt based, and regret based. It will also highlight specific therapeutic strategies (e.g., bridging the consciously held but sequestered positive self-views with the core negative self, interpreting defenses against one's own goodness) for helping individuals afflicted with this tragic condition.

SPEAKER

Salman Akhtar, MD is Emeritus Professor of Psychiatry at Jefferson Medical College in Philadelphia and a Training & Supervising Analyst at the Psychoanalytic Center of Philadelphia. He has nearly 500 publications to his credit which include 117 authored or edited books. Dr. Akhtar has served on the editorial boards of all three major psychoanalytic journals, including the Journal of the American Psychoanalytic Association, International Journal and Psychoanalytic Quarterly. He has delivered Plenary Addresses at the Meetings of the American as well as the International Psychoanalytic Associations. Dr. Akhtar has received numerous honors, including the highly prestigious Sigourney Award (2012) for Distinguished Contributions to Psychoanalysis. He has published 18 volumes of 2 poetry in three languages and serves as the Scholar-in-Residence at the Inter-Act Theater Company in Philadelphia.
